PREPARATIONS FOR EBOLA

TC Hospital is developing and implementing Ebola treatment and training protocols . The strategies are related to early recognition and identification of a suspected patient, patient isolation, strict adherence to infection control protocols, appropriate donning and doffing of PPEs (Personal Protective Equipment) and supportive medical care.a

The protocols for management are based on Center for Disease Control (CDC), World Health Organization (WHO) and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) guidelines. Recently, the TCI Hospital was visited by consultants from PAHO who reviewed the protocols and inspected the facilities at both sites. They expressed confidence with the hospitals preparedness efforts and pledged ongoing technical support through the Ministry of Health and Human Services.

TCI Hospital is demonstrating significant and proactive leadership to help our country prepare for and effectively manage any outbreak of Ebola within its many borders says CEO Jill Magri. She added, "We are working closely with national and global agencies to develop evidencebased international treatment and case management protocols. We have already placed orders for the required supplies and materials to protect our patients and our care providers and a training plan for all staff has been developed."



Planning is key according to our Chief of Medical Services, Dr. Denise Braithwaite-Tennant. She added "We have to plan so we can be prepared and mitigate the risk of our health care workers becoming infected and avoid transmission of the disease within the community by isolating and effectively treating suspected cases. Part of our training program involves the identification of a rapid response team that can be activated to care for suspected patients. We continue to revise protocols as new updates are published by the CDC, PAHO and WHO."

In phase two students will participate in an intensive mentorship, coaching and practical application experience involving senior level staff at the Hospital." JOURNEY TO DIAMOND – 4 Months to Go!

The Accreditation Canada survey date is confirmed for 23-27 March 2015 so we will provide you with regular updates on progress and preparation suggestions.

So far, nine of the 15 Accreditation Teams have completed at least five selfassessment questionnaires. This is excellent progress as it is an increase of eight since the end of October. Thank you to all who made this possible.

The following are ways to prepare yourself for your part in retaining Diamond Accreditation:

- 1. Have your manager review with you the list of potential questions specific to your area of work that the Surveyors could ask you;
- 2. Familiarise yourselves with the content of the "Quality" site on the hospital intranet (click on "Departments" and then select "Quality" from the drop-down list);
- 3. Record any quality improvement initiatives in which you have been involved in the past 12 months or have plans to implement on the "Quality Improvement Charter" (also found on the Quality site);
- 4. Invite me to deliver a session on Accreditation and/or implementation of Quality Improvement initiatives;
- 5. Know the answers to the following questions which the Surveyors will potentially ask you:



How would you report an incident?

- What would be your role if there was a major disaster on the island that resulted in 50 casualties being transferred to the hospital?
- What outcomes do you measure to determine whether you are doing a good job?
- How do you ensure that you are competent to undertake your role?
- How does your team communicate changes?
- What would you consider to be the most significant quality improvement initiative in your area of work in the last 12 months and why?
- 6. If you don't know the answers to all of the above questions, get together with your colleagues to agree responses / come up with ways to address any issues.

NEWS FROM ELSEWHERE – InterHealth Canada's Latest Project

he InterHealth Canada office in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia has recently completed its latest project, master planning for the Prince Mohammed Medical City (PMMC) in Al Jouf, KSA, with an anticipated start date in the first quarter 2015. PMMC is one of five medical cities planned as part of the Royal Mandate plan to establish 5100 tertiary care medical cities throughout the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. The hospital located in Al Jouf will provide tertiary care services for Al Jouf and the Northern borders. The hospital will consist of three hospitals contained on a single site and is expected to employ over 9,500 staff.
